Student Outcomes Analysis - Bachelor

The reporting regarding the student outcomes for the Bachelor of Science in International Hospitality Management, offered by the Ecole hôtelière de Lausanne (EHL), was prepared for the institutional interim self-evaluation report sent to the New England Commission of Higher Education ([NECHE](#)) on July 17, 2018.

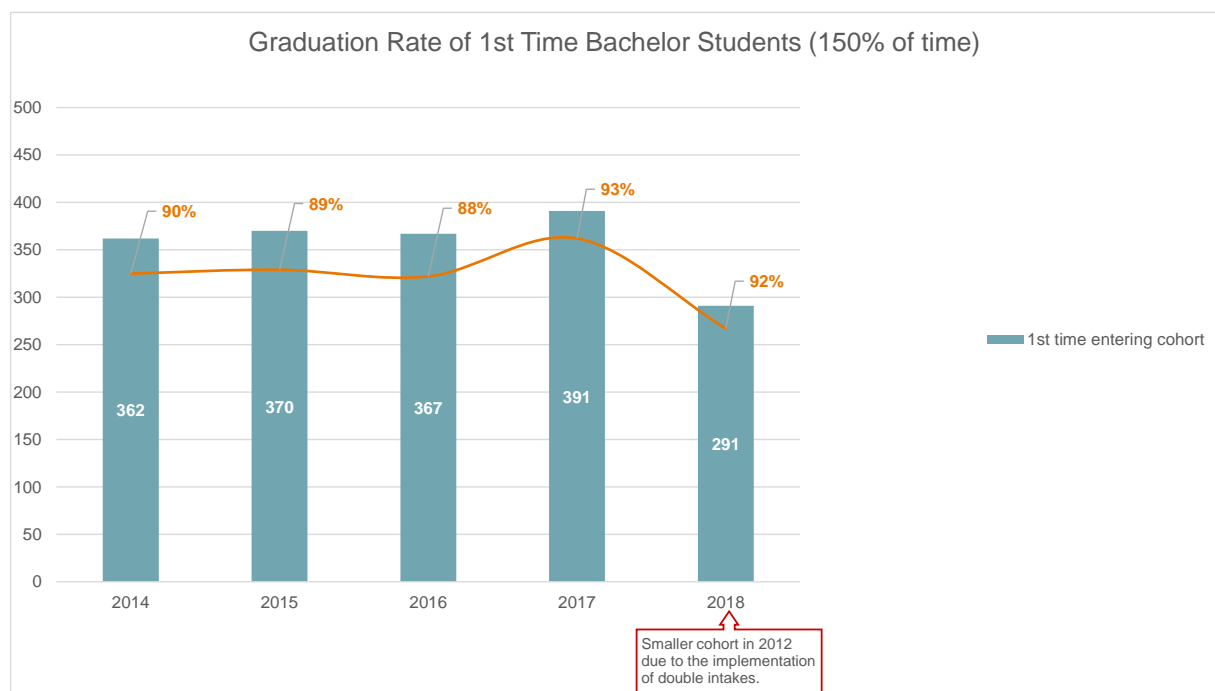
The first section provides data regarding the graduation rate for first time student entering in the Preparatory Year of the Bachelor course and non-first time student entering either in the first or the second year of the bachelor course. Since the graduation rate is calculated for the maximum duration of studies (150% of normal duration), the first time students cohort enrolled 6 years before the reporting date, the Bachelor year-1 cohort enrolled 4 years before the reporting date and the Bachelor year-2 cohort entered 3 years before the reporting date.

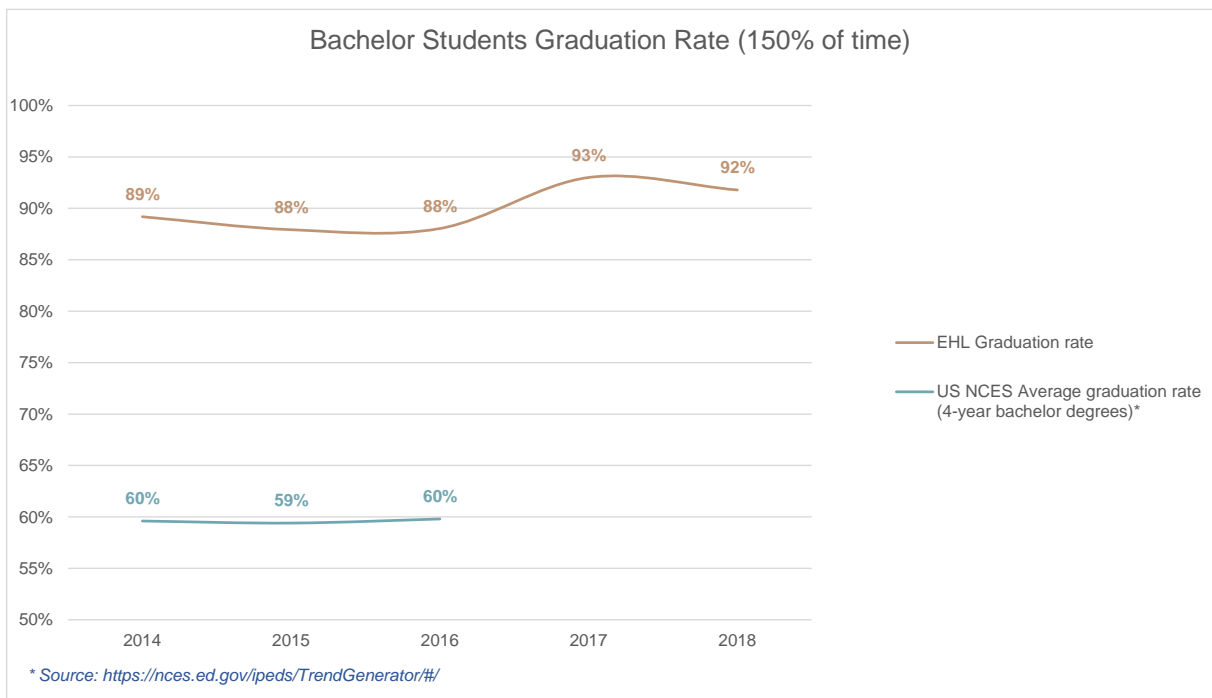
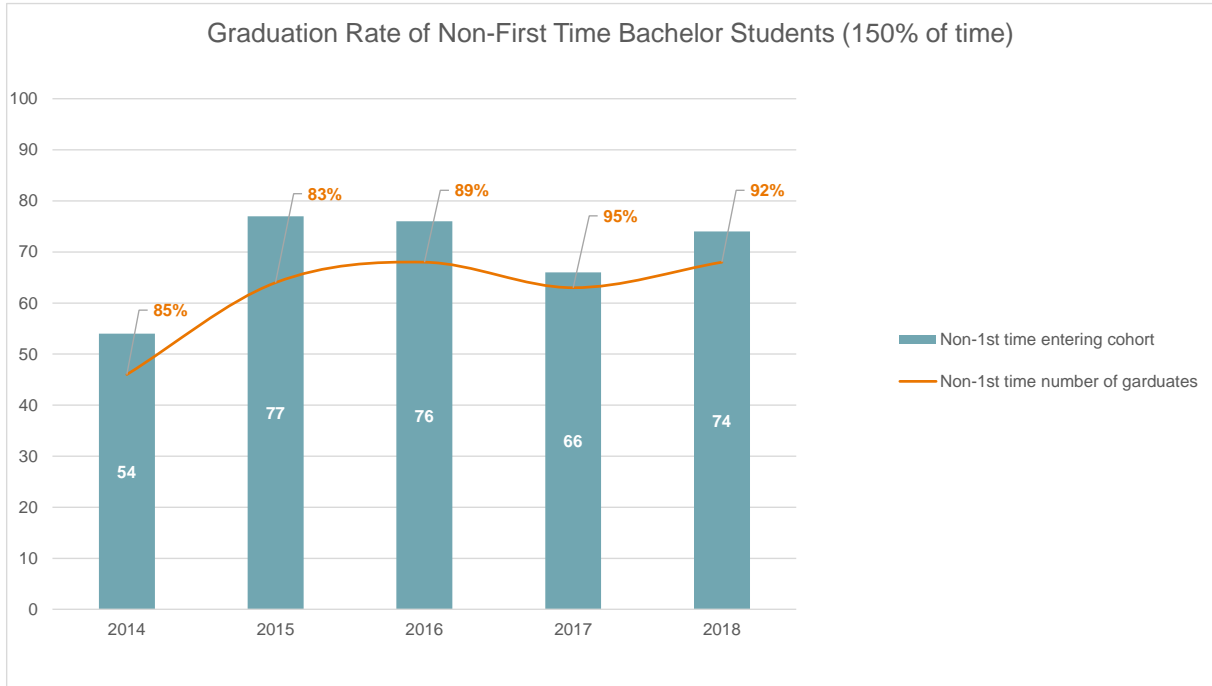
The second section provided data regarding the retention rate. This ratio examines the percentage of bachelor's degree seeking students enrolled in the prior fiscal year that are still enrolled in the reporting year. It should be noted that the ratio used at EHL has been calculated for the entire duration of studies and graduating students are then excluded from the cohort. As indicated, the calculation is also based on the enrolment for a given fiscal year (this method allows to better factor the switch from annual to semester based intakes). Whereas in the US the ratio is usually based on a comparison for the fall cohort between two consecutive years and, only for the first two years of the course.

The data provided is also benchmarked against the average for four-year postsecondary institutions offering a bachelor's or equivalent degree in the US, retrieved from the website of the National Center for Education Statistics (<https://nces.ed.gov/ipeds/TrendGenerator/#>).
